Fortunately, Alyssa stuck it out and was announced the None Jakarta Cilik. "I guess that's because I was more like a kid than other contestants," she remembers. Winning the None competition opened many other opportunities for her, including writing for a national newspaper and being an emcee in front of former president Megawati.

Being competitive doesn't mean Alyssa doesn't know how to have fun. When she was shooting for TPI in 2002, for example, she remembers having a blast. "It was fun! I met new friends everywhere and we played hide-and-seek on location until the director was mad at us for playing too much. But we're kids, right? So it doesn't feel like work or competition or anything else. It feels like we're playing around."

So what's Alyssa's favorite competition so far?

"Math competition at school, because afterwards we get to eat free pizza!" she admitted with a laugh. Seriously? "Well, STAR TEEN was also fun for me because it was my first major competition as a teenager," Alyssa confessed. "I also made so many new friends and got the best roommate in the world!"

These days, Alyssa is busy participating in the Model United Nations, which brought her to Qatar at the end of January.
